

GOD FITS BEST

The God and the world we meet in our first reading this weekend looks nothing like ours. Elijah begs bread from a stranger and God rewards her with bread and oil until the drought is over. In our world, Elijah would be fed at a shelter, the widow would get food stamps, and God would not play any part.

Whenever our experience of the world is radically changed, then our experience of the God who made sense of that old world must also change. Otherwise God becomes irrelevant to the world.

When the planes crashed into the towers of New York and changed the mindset of America, old religionists assumed that God was punishing us for our sins. But we know that if we had had the correct information, we could have aborted the terrorists. We would not have bothered God.

Every nation considered itself to be special to God. The Jews consider themselves a chosen people. America called itself the "city on a hill" giving light, instruction, and hope to other nations. We thought we were a political instrument of God. But we now know that all nations are equidistant from God. Each has its own task and destiny.

Each person in the world feels particularly close to God, loved by God and that leads to a feeling of being the most important. Even when facts prove that to be untrue. Competitors in every arena appeal to God for special consolation. But God does not play favorites.

Now, if we can no longer use God to advance our personal or natural agendas, then what do we know without God? We know that the world is a wondrous but dangerous place, that humans are between animals and angels, that life is an adventure doomed by death, that love is a fantastic but fragile affair.

God does not micromanage every action. Nor does God manipulate nations in some international chess match. And with individual people, God does not command every thought, word, and deed. God gives us freedom to choose, then includes our every yes and no within His larger freedom to make things come out right.

Since God allows creation so much leeway, disasters are always possible. Each of us will surely die, and we can kill the planet before that. We don't need someone to take care of us or heal our wounds or be like us only better. We need someone to adore.

And what does God need from us? Nothing. What might God want from you? Not your righteous works or vulgar sins, not your excuses or explanations, not your sacrifices or penances, not your monstrous failures or noble efforts. God does not want your good intentions.

God wants you!

ST. IGNATIUS PARISH APPEAL 2015-2016

Recently, you should have received a letter regarding our parish appeal. While we were a little late getting started with last year's appeal, we are running this year's appeal on time. The 2015-2016 annual parish appeal began on October 11, 2015 and will run until January 31, 2016. This is one of our largest sources of income, aside from our normal Sunday collections, and is needed for the daily operation of our parish. This year, our parish appeal goal is \$175,000. These funds will be used to offset our operational costs such as utilities, insurances, building maintenance, grounds upkeep, as well as many other operational obligations. In addition, these funds will help with future infrastructure upgrades, such as building maintenance on the Church, the pointing on the school, and the completion of the upgrades to the school entrance. Today's Gospel is about the poor widow who still managed to give despite meager means. Jesus taught us that simply giving from one's surplus is much different than putting our whole being in to the Church, which is a Church of the poor for the poor.

"Gather Your People" (#837) reminds us that all people make up the one body of the Church. That includes the rich and the poor. Even the poor widow in today's Gospel still did what she could to help others, even with modest means herself. "Blest Are They" (#735) is a reminder that the Beatitudes tell us that those who are poor indeed inherit the Kingdom of God. Our Communion hymn, Psalm 34, "The Cry of the Poor" (#47) is a beautiful reminder from the Psalmist that the Lord hears the poor and lowly. It fits well with today's Responsorial



"We Are Called" (#807), appearing frequently in our repertoire since the social justice message is strong in this series of Gospel readings, is a fitting closing hymn.

We will once again have a Children's Choir sing the 4:00pm Vigil Mass and the Adult Choir sings at the 12:00 Midnight Mass.
