

MIRACLES

Jesus did not heal the sick, cast out demons and calm storms in order to prove that He was God. At the time He lived, many holy men

and women were believed capable of doing miracles and no one would have concluded that they were God. In the New Testament, miracles are all about power and the mediating of power. No one ever claimed that Jesus could not do the miracles described in the Gospels. They did, however, accuse Him of using the power of Satan and not the power of God in his miraculous activity. They said this because He performed miracles on the Sabbath and some felt that such activity violated the Sabbath observance. No one employing the power of God to perform miracles would do so in violation of the Sabbath. More important than this, however is to understand Jesus' miraculous activity as symbolizing His ushering in of the Messianic age. From a faith perspective, Jesus does this because He is in fact the Messiah.

We read in this weekend's Gospel that Jesus heals a person who is both deaf and suffering from some sort of speech impediment. The ritual Jesus used to bring about the healing was rather traditional and included taking the man aside, using touch, saliva, and incantation. Many healers would have done similar actions. The point here, however, is not so much that Jesus can mediate God's power and thus bring about healing. The point is that this is just one more example of Jesus demonstrating that the Messianic age is here and that He is the Messiah. Here He enables the deaf to hear and the mute to speak. In other places He will make the blind see and even bring the dead back to life. He's far from more than just another miracle worker. In fact, He does not want to be known as a miracle worker and thus instructs the crowds not to tell anyone what He has just done. They are astonished at what Jesus has done but in most cases it is for the wrong reasons. He will not be able to be fully understood until after His suffering, death, and resurrection then His true identity as Messiah and Son of God will be fully revealed.

These miraculous actions of Jesus are not done to demonstrate that He was some sort of magician who could exercise exotic power at will. Their purpose is far different from that. With Jesus the New Age has begun. He calls this New Age the Kingdom of God. It is something that has been promised especially by the Old Testament prophets. It will not be a world of business as usual. The oppressors will be brought low and the lowly will be raised up. We believe that time has come and is at least partially here. Whose values do we enhance? Whose kingdom do we promote? Are we helping people to really see, hear, and enhance the good news? Do we believe Jesus really is the Messiah?
