

Last year on this Sunday, Pope Francis declared this year a *Jubilee Year of Mercy*. Saint John Paul II named the Second Sunday of Easter “Sunday of Divine Mercy” in response to Saint Faustina Kowalska’s Divine Mercy devotion, which offered spiritual comfort to hearts worldwide. But Francis challenges us to make that comfort we receive a gift we gladly share: “We are called to show mercy because mercy has first been shown to us.” The clearest expression of merciful love, says Francis, is pardoning others. “At times how hard it seems to forgive!” he acknowledges. “And yet pardon is the instrument placed into our fragile hands to attain serenity of heart” (*Misericordiae Vultus*, 9).

The necessary condition for living joyfully? “To let go of anger, wrath, violence, and revenge.” May Divine Mercy Sunday in this *Jubilee Year of Mercy* remind us that Jesus made mercy our life’s ideal and a criterion for our faith’s credibility: “Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy” (Matthew 5:7).

From the Desk of Father Jon...

Reflection for the 2nd Sunday of Easter (Divine Mercy Sunday):

Rejoice for the Lord has truly risen! Alleluia!

Once, in a Seminary class, a professor asked this question. "What are the only man-made things in Heaven." This question or riddle has an answer that gives one much to contemplate. The answer is the wounds from the nails and the spear on Christ's body. These wounds will be visible to us – if we are blessed to enter Heaven. The viewing of these wounds are not for condemnation but to show the great love that the Heavenly Father has for us in offering His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, in payment of the debt owed by our sinfulness. That beautiful sacrificial love takes away our fears and renews us in our strength and courage.

This overcoming of fear is displayed in our readings on this Divine Mercy Sunday. We begin with the Apostles fearlessly preaching at Solomon's portico. Many people were attracted to their message – the Truth of Jesus Christ – and hearing the Truth overcomes their fear. The portico of Solomon was part of the Temple in Jerusalem and faced the east. This was the gate that the Messiah, in Jewish belief, would come through to enter His Temple. We see the Apostles entering doing the work of Christ healing the sick and exorcising demons and overcoming fears.

But before they could do the work of Christ their own fears had to be silenced. This is the scene in our Gospel this day. Saint John gives a detailed account of this. We see the Apostles and disciples in the upper room behind locked doors out of fear. It is in to this room of fear that our Lord passes through the barrier set and offers His peace AND THEN shows the marks humanity has put on Him. And once again offers His peace. These wounds do not condemn but invite. They are an invitation to the peace of God and a life without fear. A life of living in the courage of Truth that Christ offers to us. The Apostles accept this offer and fearlessly live out the Gospel and preaching the Goods News.

Many of us know what it is to live in fear and lock ourselves away both physically and metaphorically. Jesus Christ can pass through any barriers we erect to offer us a life to be fully lived. A life lived bravely with courage knowing that we are following the Lord's plan for us. For us to be fully alive we must be without fear. To accept Christ is the only way we can achieve that life.

May we respond to Christ invitation and respond in the same manner as Saint Thomas, "My Lord and my God!"

While all of the baptized are called to share in the mission of Jesus Christ according to the gifts of the Holy Spirit, those who are ordained also offer service in a way proper to the Sacrament of Holy Orders. A deacon's ministry entails proclaiming, preaching and teaching God's Word, assisting the bishop and priest at the Liturgy, assisting at funerals, ministering to the sick and dying, leading the community in prayer and in sacramental liturgies, baptizing, witnessing marriages, and exercising administrative leadership in the Church. **A permanent deacon, who may be married, is a member of the clergy and shares in the hierarchy of the Sacrament of Holy Orders.** Through the Sacrament of Holy Orders, the deacon is configured to Christ the Servant. It is Christ the Servant who acts through the ministry of the deacon.
