

HOPE AND LIFE



Today's readings tell the story of two widows. The first reading relates the plight of the widow with whom the prophet Elijah stayed; the Gospel tells about the widow of Nain. In each story, the widow's only son had died. For people who lived in those cultures, the son was the only support of a widow, and the carrying on of the family name by the son was equal to immortality. A widow whose only son has died could lose all hope.

Elijah and Jesus are the restorers of hope; they bring the sons back to life. Saint Paul was metaphorically raised from the dead when he experienced the conversion and call from God that he describes in today's second reading. What are Christians called to do today? We may not be able to raise the dead, but perhaps we can rekindle hope for a single parent. We may not be able to convert a persecutor like Paul, but if we speak the gospel openly and gently with our lives, we might touch a life with the Good News.



From the Administrator's Desk...


On April 12th, our House of Representatives passed Bill 1947, to amend the criminal and civil statutes of limitation (SoL) related to acts of childhood sexual abuse. The bill then passed to the Senate Judiciary Committee. With regard to this *crime*, HB 1947 *prospectively* eliminates the criminal SoL. If our Senate passes HB 1947 and our Governor signs it, victims currently under 18 years old could press charges in criminal court at any time in the future. This possibility would put the several types of sexual abuse into the company of other unspeakable crimes such as murder—with which it tragically shares many similarities.

Regarding *civil* actions arising from childhood sexual abuse, HB 1947 would extend the SoL from the victim's current age limit of 30 years old to 50. Sound civil law has never admitted a stretch of 32-50 years in a civil SoL, given the possibility of the perpetrator's death or the absence, years later, of credible witnesses and evidence. Add to this that public entities, such as public schools, would not be subject to such an expanded SoL, given the law's favor of "Sovereign Immunity" - that limit on the amount for which a claimant can sue a public entity, lest bankruptcy ensue. HB 1947 is clearly directed at private entities such as our Catholic Church, with no limits. This, when the rate of sexual abuse has been immensely greater in public schools—an established nation-wide fact.

I need not go into the details of what the Archdiocese of Philadelphia has done

- to purify the ranks of its clergy and employees
- to require its clergy, employees, and volunteers to acquire the fullest local and national criminal clearance, and
- to complete the most exacting training for safeguarding children.

Expansion of the criminal SoL has led to the bankruptcy of parishes and dioceses, as e.g. in nearby Wilmington, DE, which emptied the Diocese's charitable trust of some \$43,000,000, decimating its works of corporal mercy, closing inner city schools, etc. Unscrupulous lawyers categorize states according to their current vulnerability. While our Archdiocese has set the standard for safeguarding children in our Commonwealth, the recent grand jury revelations in the Diocese of Johnstown-Altoona has made the church in Pennsylvania ripe for the picking—if we allow it... Impoverishing the members of parishes and dioceses for crimes which predate them by decades defies comprehension and any standard of justice.

ST. IGNATIUS FISCAL CORNER

As we all can guess, our largest line item in the budget, or in any budget is salaries and benefits. Here at St. Ignatius, those line items alone account for 67.5% of our anticipated budget. Our current salary, payroll taxes and fringe benefits are projected for FY 2017 to be \$1,603,344. This includes Church salaries (including religious) of \$361,322, church payroll taxes and benefits totaling \$127,661, School salaries totaling \$871,196, and school payroll taxes and benefits totaling \$243,166. We here at St. Ignatius are very aware of the costs for these resources and are always looking for efficiencies. We have an excellent staff and use a combination of full time and specialized part time employees to meet the needs of our parish and our school. Continuing our monthly expense theme, our monthly salary and benefits costs are estimated to be \$133,612. If you add that expense to the monthly cost of “keeping the lights on” (\$55,311) you can see our monthly financial obligations are approximately \$188,923. This does not include discretionary spending, or any other expenses not yet identified in this column. Compared to just our estimated \$60,800 per month in Sunday contributions, you can see a very large shortfall. As you know, a parish does not operate on Sunday collections alone. The additional funding needed to cover our monthly expenses is mostly generated by our average monthly school tuition income (\$77,857 per month) and prep tuition (\$6,070 per month) as well as our ACH Collections, annual appeal, Sunday, Easter and Holy day collections (averages \$35,845 per month), as well as other income generated by the parish (approximately \$8,000 per month) for an estimated total parish income of \$188,572. As you can see, we have a very tight cash flow. As we move into the next fiscal year, we are exploring new and fun ways to raise funds here at St. Ignatius. We hope we can count on your help and support when we kick these new fundraisers into gear.

FAREWELL TO FATHER DALIN


Father will be leaving us to become the School Minister for Archbishop Ryan High School.
