December 1, 2019 First Sunday of Advent

Reading I: Isaiah 2: 1-5

The prophet offers a vision of all the nations gathering on Mt. Zion. Most prophets join Isaiah as conceiving the Messiah's arrival as bringing about a time of justice and peace.

Reading II: Romans 13: 11-14

Paul urges his readers to show by their actions that they are true Christians. He believed that the end time was near and that now everyone must throw off any sin still in their lives. As one does this, also believe that Christ is the armor you must wear in your defense against the opposition.

The Gospel: Matthew 24: 37-44

The writer issues warnings through the story of the great Flood for his hearers to make them alert, and to be conscious of their need to be prepared for the arrival of the Day of the Lord. It will come unannounced and swiftly.

St. Nicholas
Pray for Us
Feast Day December 6th

Perhaps the best-known story about Nicholas concerns his charity toward a poor man who was unable to provide dowries for his three daughters of marriageable age. Rather than see them forced into prostitution, Nicholas secretly tossed a bag of gold through the poor man's window on three separate occasions, thus enabling the daughters to be married. Over the centuries, this particular legend evolved into the custom of gift-giving on the saint's feast. In the English-speaking countries, Saint Nicholas became, by a twist of the tongue, Santa Claus—further expanding the example of generosity portrayed by this holy bishop.

Today is the first Sunday of Advent. The advent of something means it is finally here! The word is generally meant for the introduction of something

that is really important. The Advent season is a time of preparation of our hearts and minds for the anniversary of the Lord's birth on Christmas. Advent is usually represented in some liturgy by four candles, one for each week of Advent and lit on each Sunday. The first is purple symbolizing hope, sometimes called the 'prophecy candle' in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah who foretold of the birth of Christ. The next candle is also purple while the third is rose consistent with what is called Gaudete Sunday, a sign of joy! The four themes are Hope-Peace-Joy and Love. While fasting is usually associated with Lent, it would be worthwhile to consider giving something up as a fast for this preparation for one of the greatest events in the history of mankind, the birth of Jesus Christ, God becoming man to bring us salvation and show us how to live and how to die and be our Way, our Truth and our Life. Praise be to Jesus Christ.

This is the first Sunday of Advent. Let us prepare.

The season of Advent is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to preparing for the celebration of the Lord's birth on Christmas and for Christ's second coming at the end

of time. During this time of preparation and expectant waiting, we also remember expectant mothers who are preparing for the birth of their children. Jesus was an unplanned pregnancy; John the Baptist was an unplanned pregnancy; Isaac was an unplanned pregnancy. Imagine where we would be if they all had been aborted?! We are about to celebrate the Incarnation; yes, it is also called the feast of the Nativity, or more commonly, Christmas, but the importance of this season and the Incarnation is that Jesus, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, infinitely Divine, took on our humanity and elevated it to be more like Him! He came to show us how to live and, yes, how to die. He did it because He loved us and wanted us to overcome death and restore salvation. We need to reflect on these mysteries.

Pricing of Outdoor Columbarium Niches and Services are as follows:

Two Center Rows - \$3,000 Row Above and Below the Center Rows - \$2,750 Top and Bottom Row - \$2,500

The purchase of an Outdoor Columbarium Niche includes the following: Burial rights in the niche Perpetual care

Opening and closing costs: To be paid upon interment of Cremated Remains Monday – Friday: \$250 Saturday: \$300

How can I arrange to purchase a niche?

You may contact the Rectory at 215-493-3377 to make an appointment to purchase. Upon final payment, a certificate covering inumment ownership rights will be sent to the purchaser of the niche.

The Columbarium

at St. Ignatius of Antioch Cemetery

For many centuries cemeteries were commonly found in churchyards, allowing churches to minister to the spiritual needs of their members, from baptism through life to death. Since our cemetery is nearly at capacity today, we cannot offer additional burial plots at our parish cemetery. But there is a modern alternative which more and more churches are offering their members: the Columbarium.

A Columbarium is a collection of niches designed to house urns containing cremated human remains (cremains). Inscribed with the persons' names and dates of birth and death. St. Ignatius' Columbarium is located in our parish cemetery on the picturesque Delaware River. The Columbarium is self-funded, using income derived from the sale of niches for construction and operation.

Benefits of a Columbarium

- Spiritual Site for Final Resting The principal benefit a
 Columbarium affords church members and their families the
 opportunity to select their final resting place in the parish
 cemetery of the church which has been central to their lives,
 a sacred site of beauty and dignity where their loved ones
 can visit and meditate whenever they visit the cemetery.
- Simplicity of Planning The purchase of a Columbarium niche eliminates the pressures of choosing a burial site, casket, vault and monument; also, there is no need to plan for inurnment and memorial services at different locations and times.
- Substantial Financial Savings With the Columbarium, significant costs are limited to cremation, the niche, the plaque and the obituary.
