#### Reading I: 2 Samuel 7: 1-5, 8-11, 16

David is told by Nathan that the Lord will build a "house" (dynasty) and that his line will be an everlasting one that will enable people to enjoy peace.

#### Reading II: Romans 16: 25-27

Paul makes known the divine plan, which is linked with Old Testament books. He recognizes that he is called to make the Gospel known to all the nations.

#### The Gospel: Luke 1: 26-38

This section is the annunciation of Christ's birth put in parallel with the annunciation of His cousin John the Baptist's. Nazareth was an insignificant town never mentioned in the Old Testament. The angel Gabriel calls Mary "one who is enjoying God's favor," or "full of grace."

#### 2020-2021 Annual Parish Appeal



Day with prayer and reflection, along with the possible viewing of a live streamed celebration of Mass. Those who are sick or compromised due to health conditions are not to come to church.



#### ROSARY


All are invited to recite the rosary after the 9:00 Mass. For those who can stay longer, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy is also recited.

#### LIVESTREAMING ON OUR WEBPAGE AT 9:30AM





As we approach the feast of the Nativity of our Lord, Jesus this week, many of us will not be **FORMATION** celebrating in the fashion of previous years due to the pandemic. There are many restrictions on travel, on gatherings and on celebrations and we have all felt the after-effects of these 'lock-

downs' and restrictions over the past 9 months. Some of us won't get to mass but will attend through streaming; some family gatherings and dinners will not happen; some nursing home tenants will not get visitors; some grandparents won't get to see their grandchildren; some parents won't get to see their children; some siblings won't be getting together. Schools have been closed or virtual for quite a while now; there is hope and promise of a vaccine but not, perhaps, for months. Our parish ministries have been postponed/re-scheduled/or just cancelled. What is Jesus trying to tell us? Why is He allowing this to happen at this time? Over 2000 years ago, He came into this world in a very simple, poor way- born in a stable to a virgin teenager as a little baby without much fanfare other than angels singing 'on high' to announce the birth of the King of all Kings and the Savior of the world. Do we recognize Jesus as the King of all Kings? Do we celebrate Jesus as Savior of the world and the reason for our salvation? Do we talk to Him? Do we pray to Him? Do we mention His name in mixed company? Or, have we removed any mention of Him from schools, from public celebrations, from public gatherings, from courthouses and public squares??? Are we not to mention His name in public? Are the churches the first place to be 'locked down' during the pandemic? Are our Bishops defending our rights to mass and the Sacraments- the signs and sources of the graces we need to sustain us on this journey called life? What are our priorities? Perhaps, in this time of pandemic restrictions we can spend a little more time and pay a little more attention to prayer, reading of Scripture, a visit to adoration (10 AM to 8 PM M-F at St. Ignatius) or daily mass or reception of the Sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist. After all, He did bring His divinity to our humanity; He did live among us; He did die for us; He did give us HIS WORD; He did give us our Church- the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church and He has sent messages/apparitions and saints to keep us informed. There has to be a reason!? Maybe He is speaking to us all? St. Thomas Aquinas, pray for us.

Respect "God's love is generous, sacrificial, life-giving, and forever. As humans made in God's image, we are called to imitate the eternal giving and receiving of love that is the Holy Trinity." God so love the Son, and the Son so loved the Father that their love become the Third Person of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit- the Lord, the Giver of Life as is prayed in the Creed; in marriage the love between husband and wife is said to be 'Trinitarian' in that the husband loves the wife and the wife loves the husband in their total giving of self to the other that in the presence of the Holy Spirit their loves becomes a third person- their children- created through the Holy Spirit to exist for all of eternity! And part of God's plan for life and love. This week we celebrate the feast of the Incarnation of God becoming man- His love manifested for us so physically that He became the person of Jesus Christ, born of a virgin, without sin to show us how to live, to show us how to die, to tell us what to do and to give us the Church and His Word that we may safely navigate this journey we call life, one of the 'rights' enshrined in our Constitution. So, let us turn to Him and His ways and His Word so that His Incarnation is not in vain.

#### How much does a niche cost?

Pricing of Outdoor Columbarium Niches and Services are as follows:

Two Center Rows - \$3,000 Row Above and Below the Center Rows - \$2,750 Top and Bottom Row - \$2,500

The purchase of an Outdoor Columbarium Niche includes the following: Burial rights in the niche Perpetual care

Opening and closing costs: To be paid upon interment of Cremated Remains Monday – Friday: \$250 Saturday: \$300

### How can I arrange to purchase a niche?

You may contact the Rectory at 215-493-3377 to make an appointment to purchase. Upon final payment, a certificate covering inumment ownership rights will be sent to the purchaser of the niche.

#### The Columbarium

at St. Ignatius of Antioch Cemetery

For many centuries cemeteries were commonly found in churchyards, allowing churches to minister to the spiritual needs of their members, from baptism through life to death. Since our cemetery is nearly at capacity today, we cannot offer additional burial plots at our parish cemetery. But there is a modern alternative which more and more churches are offering their members: the Columbarium.

A Columbarium is a collection of niches designed to house urns containing cremated human remains (cremains). Inscribed with the persons' names and dates of birth and death. St. Ignatius' Columbarium is located in our parish cemetery on the picturesque Delaware River. The Columbarium is self-funded, using income derived from the sale of niches for construction and operation.

#### Benefits of a Columbarium

- Spiritual Site for Final Resting The principal benefit a
  Columbarium affords church members and their families the
  opportunity to select their final resting place in the parish
  cemetery of the church which has been central to their lives,
  a sacred site of beauty and dignity where their loved ones
  can visit and meditate whenever they visit the cemetery.
- Simplicity of Planning The purchase of a Columbarium niche eliminates the pressures of choosing a burial site, casket, vault and monument; also, there is no need to plan for inurnment and memorial services at different locations and times.
- Substantial Financial Savings With the Columbarium, significant costs are limited to cremation, the niche, the plaque and the obituary.
