November 1, 2020 Solemnity of All Saints

Reading I: Revelation 7: 2-4, 9-14

Here we have two distinct visions of John. In the first, 144, 000 are observed "sealed on the forehead" with God's name for their fidelity to Him. In the second, an uncountable group from all nations wear white robes cleansed in the Lamb's Blood and they hoist the palm frond of victory.

Reading II: I John 3: 1-3

This is an exhortation to the Johannine community that God's love for them makes them "children of God." They sing in response, because they believe they will become divinized. They also believe that God demands of them that they be as pure as possible.

The Gospel: Matthew 5: 1-12a

The famous "Sermon on the Mount," encompassing the next two chapters in Matthew, begins with Jesus' eight beatitudes. A beatitude is defined as "an exclamation of congratulations that recognizes an existing state of happiness."

FISCAL CORNER

As of our fourth full week of the Parish appeal, 158 families have contributed \$39,940 toward our goal of \$150,000. We are at 26.63% of this year's goal. It should also be noted, we are now \$16,190 behind last year's pace. We ask that you please consider a gift towards this most important appeal!

This is one of our largest sources of income, aside from our normal Sunday collections, and is greatly needed for the daily operation of our parish. While our Sunday collections are consistent, we are facing a shortfall in the school due to Covid remediation. Additional cost for cleaning and sanitizing, additional staff for remediation, supplies and signage, as well as the reduction in enrollment in our PreK program will result in a larger than average parish subsidy. If you can help with this effort, it would be greatly appreciated! You should have received our appeal materials in the mail. If you have not, there are appeal envelopes located in the entrances of the church. Please return your donation by placing this year's appeal envelope in the collection basket at Mass, mail your contribution or drop it off directly to the rectory. CHILDREN'S Liturgy of the Word

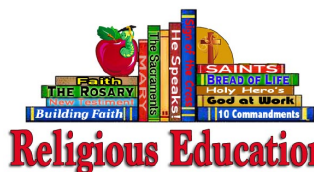

From the Religious Education Office ... The PREP office is open from Sundays through Thursdays. I am in the Antioch Center (old rectory) on Sundays and weekday evenings.

PREP (Parish Religious Education Program) is for children in Grades K to 8. PREP classes are being held remotely (at least until January). Annmarie is recording our teachers every week while they teach their “classes.” Parents can find these lessons on the parish website. (Go to stignatius.church, and then click on PREP. The grade levels will come up, so click on the level you want. Finish up by completing the Interactive Session Review and send results to Mrs. Perini’s email – lperini@stignatius.church). Each class’s lesson will be available for 3 weeks only. Then the next lesson will replace it. Registered families can communicate with the teachers by email. If you missed registration, please stop in our office or call us (215-493-5204) to receive the registration form by email.

Special Needs: Parents, are you aware that we have a PREP class for students with special needs? If we could help to give your child a religious education in a small group environment, please call Annmarie at 215-493-5204.

8th Grade Students: Our program this year is Matthew Kelly's Decision Point. Parents, please encourage your 8th graders to continue their study of God and his Church. Confirmation is not graduation from learning about God; this is a lifetime commitment.

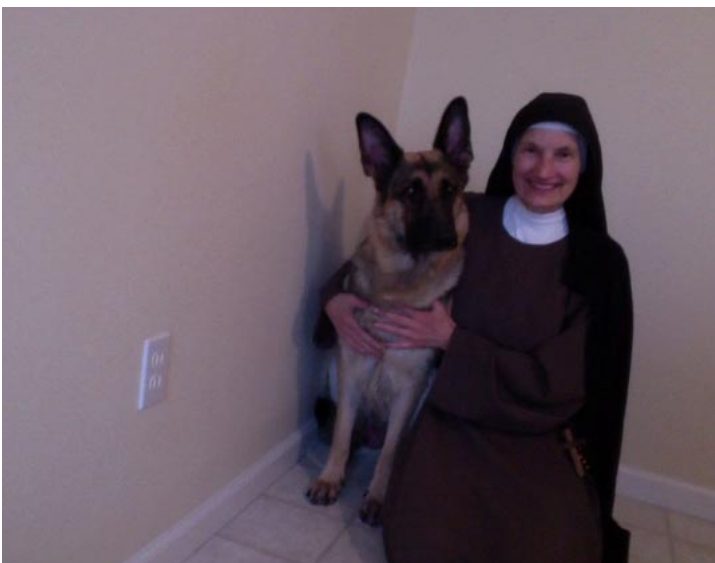
Fr. Pio Mandato FMHJ is a Franciscan priest living as a missionary hermit in the Diocese of Scranton PA. under Bishop Joseph C. Bambera, D. D..

He was born in Italy. His parents came from Pietrelcina in Southern Italy, the same town as Saint Pio, the famous stigmatist priest whom they knew very well. Fr. Pio received his First Holy Communion from Saint Pio before coming to the USA. He grew up in New Jersey and entered the Capuchin Franciscans at the age of 17, where he received his Franciscan formation and later his priestly ordination in 1985 .

Since then he has been involved in various apostolates throughout the years, from hospital chaplaincy to working with the homeless in NY, to giving periodic retreats.

In 1998 after being accepted into the Diocese of Scranton by Bishop Timlin D. D., he began living a

life of solitude and prayer consisting of Adoring the Lord, Prayerful intercession for the Church in her needs, living a life of repentance and conversion and of joyful Thanksgiving in the Franciscan charism. He is also Chaplain to the Capuchin Sisters of Nazareth and at times goes forth to preach retreats.



Sister Theresa May C.N. (Capuchin Sisters of Nazareth)

A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., Sr. Theresa May entered the Franciscan Missionaries of the Infant Jesus in 1969. After spending two years in formation in Assisi, Italy, she returned to the US to begin teaching in various grade schools in 1973. She completed her teaching degree and certification in 1983 when she was again sent to Rome for various courses on religious life.

In 1985, she was assigned as principal of Our Lady of Perpetual Help School in Highlands, NJ, where she worked until 1988. She then left to work with the poor in the South Bronx area.

In 1994, she went to New Bedford, Massachusetts,

where under the auspices of Bishop Sean O'Malley, she helped begin a new community of Sisters devoted to prayer and poverty.

The Capuchin Sisters of Nazareth is an apostolic contemplative community presently located in Tunkhannock, PA under the jurisdiction of Bishop Joseph Bombara D. D. The Sisters live a life of prayer and have a small ministry of preaching retreats, parish missions, and youth work.
