Reading I: Isaiah 25: 6-10a

The banquet on Mt. Zion represents a favorite image of the messianic times. It is "spread before us" (Psalm 23 today) out of the Lord's generosity.

Reading II: Philippians 4: 12-14, 19-20

The Lord's banquet can fully satisfy all our needs "in accord with His glorious riches." As such, this banquet does just that.

The Gospel: Matthew 22: 1-14 or 22: 1-10

The kingdom of God is also depicted as a messianic banquet. God freely invites the guests, but some of them refuse to come. So the king (God) decides to invite others not originally intended who eagerly respond, even though some among them are unworthy types who must be cast out.

FISCAL CORNER

Our 2020-2021 Annual Parish Appeal is underway! This critical parish financial appeal will run from October through the end of January. This is one of our largest sources of income, aside from our normal Sunday collections, and is greatly needed for the daily operation of our parish. While our Sunday collections are consistent, we are facing a shortfall in the school due to Covid remediation. Additional cost for cleaning and sanitizing, additional staff for remediation, supplies and signage, as well as the reduction in enrollment in our PreK program will result in a larger than average parish subsidy. If you can help with this effort, it would be greatly appreciated! You should have received our appeal materials in the mail. If you have not, there are appeal envelopes located in the entrances of the church. Please return your donation by placing this year's appeal envelope in the collection basket at Mass, mail your contribution or drop it off directly to the rectory.

As of our first full week of the Parish appeal, 53 families have contributed \$12,725 toward our goal of \$150,000. We are at 8% of this year's goal. Thank you for your generosity!

The truth of the Gospel of life is at the foundation of who we are as followers of Christ. In his earthly life, Jesus provided the perfect model for how we are to love our neighbor and live out the Gospel call: "Truly, I say to you, as you did

it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me" (Mt. 25:40). Jesus calls each of us to "care for the other as a person for whom God has made us responsible" (EV 87). The Gospel of life is intrinsic to the whole Christian life and foundational to the decisions we make on a daily basis. For, "the Gospel of God's love for man, the Gospel of the dignity of the person and the Gospel of life are a single and indivisible Gospel" (EV 2, emphasis added).

This message is very appropriate as a message for 'our times'; we need to RESPECT the dignity of every person; we need to be tolerant and even loving of each other, not necessarily those principles which defy the truth of God's plan and His message as pronounced by the Magisterium of the Catholic Church. We need to love our neighbor! Not just like them; not just tolerate them, but love them. St. Paul in his letter to 1Cor 12:31-13:13 tells us the meaning of love- kind; patient; not jealous; not pompous; not inflated; not rude; not quick-tempered; not brooding over injury; rejoices with truth. Let us read this passage, look at our own behaviors toward family and friends and neighbors, and, even strangers and make 'adjustments', not just this month, but every month.






CELEBRATING OUR PARTRON ST. IGNATIUS OF ANTIOCH

We celebrate the feast of our patron saint, St. Ignatius of Antioch on Oct. 17. The artwork in our church is designed to help us reflect on his amazing life. Tradition has it that it was Ignatius, as a young boy, who Christ took in his arms in the Gospel of Mark, 9:35.

Then he sat down, called the Twelve, and said to them, 'If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all.' Taking a child he placed it in their midst, and putting his arms around it he said to them, 'Whoever receives one child such as this in my name, receives me; and whoever receives me, receives not me but the One who sent me.'

Ignatius was later named bishop of Antioch and died a martyr for the faith in the year 107 AD

under the persecution of the Emperor Trajan. He wrote letters while on his journey to Rome emphasizing the unity of the Church. He was sent to his death at the teeth of lions who devoured his body in front of Roman spectators.

He wrote: "I am God's wheat and shall be ground by the teeth of wild animals. I am writing to all the churches to let it be known that I will gladly die for God if only you do not stand in my way.

"At last I am becoming his disciple. May nothing entice me till I happily make my way to Jesus Christ! Fire, cross, struggles with wild beasts, wrenching of bones, mangling of limbs-let them come to me, provided only I make my way to Jesus Christ. I would rather die and come to Jesus Christ than be king over the entire earth. Him I seek who died for us; him I love who rose again because of us."

LITTLE SISTERS of the POOR

In 1869 Archbishop Wood of Philadelphia invited the Little Sisters of the Poor from France to come and assist in caring for the vast numbers of elderly poor in the city. The charism of their foundress, St. Jeanne Jugan serving the poorest in simplicity, humility and trust in Divine Providence (begging), imbued them with the gift of fortitude for 150 years in Philadelphia through faithfully observing their vows of poverty, chastity, obedience, and hospitality while personally assisting the dying with firm belief - "It is Jesus Himself whom you are serving in the Poor." JJ.
