

January 31, 2021 The Fourth Sunday of Ordinary Time

Reading I: Deuteronomy 18: 15-20

The author wants to find a place for prophecy in his country. He describes a true prophet as a native Israelite who is called by Yahweh and continues the prophetic role of Moses.

Reading II: 1 Corinthians 7: 32-35

Paul is addressing newly married couples. We note his view of the equality of men and women. He advises couples but does not impose any solutions.

The Gospel: Mark 1: 21-28

Capernaum is the setting for this last section of Chapter One. Jesus' "amazing" teaching did not rely on appeals to Scripture or other teachers for verification. The healing He works presages the end of the power of demons.

BAPTISM

To assist with church sanitizing we are designating the front 3 pews for this devotion. We hope to resume 24/7 Perpetual Adoration in the Chapel when it is advisable. FISCAL CORNER

As of January 25th, we are getting ready to close out this year's Parish appeal. A final report will be given next week, as we are still accepting contributions that will count towards this year's appeal. As of 1/25/21, we have collected \$137,740, approximately \$12,260 short of this year's goal of \$150,000. We ask that you please consider a gift in these final days towards this most important appeal!

This is one of our largest sources of income, aside from our normal Sunday collections, and is greatly needed for the daily operation of our parish. We are seeing a small decrease in our total Sunday collections as well as facing a shortfall in the school due to Covid remediation. Additional cost for cleaning and sanitizing, additional staff for remediation, supplies and signage, as well as the reduction in enrollment in our PreK program will result in a larger than average parish subsidy. If you can help with this effort, it would be greatly appreciated! You should have received our appeal materials in the mail. If you have not, there are appeal envelopes located in the entrances of the church. Our young men and especially our young women are targeted and under attack. Every day, we are fed propaganda about how wonderful and helpful abortions can be. We need to spread truth and awareness of how evil and dangerous abortion is to both the baby and mother. People must know that killing a child is not the only way out of an unexpected pregnancy; there is always someone in the world willing to adopt. We need to teach others about the sanctity of human life and God's unconditional love and mercy. For the last two years, I marched in Washington at the March for Life. I was moved, being surrounded by people willing to fight the injustice of abortion. We need to join together to help protect our world's population because life is beautiful and truly matters. 


"Walk with each other. Do not be afraid to embrace God's gift of life. Whatever storms or trials we face, we are not alone. He is with us. 'Behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age' (Matthew 28:20)." Most women we see in our crisis pregnancy centers desire to terminate their pregnancies because they are afraid; many are desperate because they don't have support; some are being forced by

family members or fathers of the baby. Most have no idea of what is involved in the abortion procedure, what the consequences may be and once we inform them with the truth and offer support and follow up for the baby and their families for 3 years, many decide for life. This is what we do. We offer a free pregnancy test to confirm the pregnancy. We bring them back for an ultrasound to confirm length of gestation and they see their babies on ultrasound, hear the heart-beats, see them moving and many cry and are joyful- almost life John the Baptist who leapt within the womb of Elizabeth when meeting Mary pregnant with Jesus! They receive counseling and support and many end with saying yes to life. In 2020 LOLF centers saved over 230 babies; in the past 12 years, over 3000. As we end this 'month of life' let's not cease to pray for life and support our crisis pregnancy centers- it IS a matter of life and death! This past week on Jan. 25 our church celebrated the conversion of St. Paul. While many of us may not need to be knocked off a horse and blinded for 3 days and have God speak directly to us and send a messenger, many of us may need some major event in our lives to lead us to know if we need conversion and why. Paul was persecuting Christians. He was persistent in this 'bad' behavior. While we may not be persecuting anyone, we may be persistent in some 'bad' behavior that needs to be converted to good. We need to start with prayer and confession to get the grace necessary to strengthen us against repetitive sin. We need to avoid the near occasions of sin. We may need to 'die unto ourselves' (a kenosis) so that we may go through a 'change of mind' (metanoia) to live our lives differently. It is not just non-Catholics that need conversion, all sinners, especially those who constantly commit the same sin, like pornography, need conversion. We need to examine our conscience and confess, repent, do penance, amend out lives to sin no more and avoid the near occasions of sin. In this world of social medial and electronic devices, try Laudate as an app on your phone to give you daily readings and reflections/prayers/examination of conscience and other necessary prayer items. Try it, it is free.

WHO? WHAT? WHY?

One of the best known Catholic Men's organizations in the world is the esteemed Knights of Columbus, founded by an American parish priest --soon to be a newly named

Catholic Saint. We rejoice in the vision of Fr. Michael J. McGivney, who was beatified last October and whose followers are praying earnestly for another miracle to justify his canonization. We anticipate he will likely be the first American-born parish priest to become a Saint. Now, Blessed Fr. McGivney is already a most effective advocate for the unemployed and for families who pray to see their children return to the Catholic Faith. Fr. McGivney died in August 1890 in Connecticut, but our own Fr. James McCafferty Council of the Knights is faithfully carrying on his goals to provide lay Catholic leadership in our church.
