



Religious Freedom Week is observed from June 22 through June 29. Thus, the week begins with the Memorial of Saints John Fisher and Thomas More and ends with the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul. Today we celebrate Father's Day. Last week we celebrated feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus which is a liturgical solemnity that falls 19 days after Pentecost on a Friday. The FORMATION devotion is one of the most widely practiced and well- known Catholic devotions taking Jesus Christ's physical heart as the representation of His Divine love for humanity. The

feast can be traced to the 11th century. It marked the spirituality of St. Bernard of Clairvaux in the 12th century and of St. Bonaventure and St. Gertrude the Great in the 13th century. The very first liturgical feast was celebrated in 1670 through the efforts of St. John Eudes. In 1856 Pope Pius IX established the feast as obligatory for the whole church. The feast is also a special day of prayer for the Sanctification of Priests.

Father's day is a day honoring fatherhood and paternal bonds as well as the influence of fathers in society. It was founded in America by Sonora Smart Dodd in 1910. It does, however, date back to 1508 when it was celebrated on the feast of St. Joseph March 19. No small coincidence that these two are celebrated today! Let all fathers dedicate their fatherhood to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and His father, St. Joseph and pray for the strength to be the leaders/providers and protectors they were called to be. One of the more common problems of contemporary society is the absence of fathers from the home, whether it be physical/emotional/spiritual/economic presence which can lead to fragmentation of families and poor mentorship for sons/future men! 1 in 4 children currently live without a father in the home, leading to 63% of all youth suicides, 90% of all runaway and homeless youths, 85% of all children with behavioral disorders and 71% of all high school dropouts. Let us pray for fathers including those of children in the womb.

St. Thomas Aquinas, pray for us. Sacred Heart of Jesus pray for us.

"Through our prayers and through the intercession of St. Joseph, patron of fathers, may fathers come to know the irreplaceable role they hold in the lives of their children, and the responsibility they share in welcoming God's gift of new life! Many of us can celebrate our fathers because they are still with us, although we may still be in some separation because of pandemic restrictions; many of us do not have our fathers with us- we can still pray to them, for them and celebrate with memories

their fatherhood and their 'yes' to our lives! Many in the prolife movement are very much into saving the babies and helping the moms, but oft times the fathers are absent or forgotten. We need to pray for those men; we need to support them too and call them to pray to St. Joseph for the strength and the courage to do what St. Joseph did-stand up for, support and provide and protect and love his betrothed who unexpectedly conceived during their engagement, and 'adopted' Jesus as his own son and led Him into the man Our Lord became so He could be Father to us all! Thank you, St. Joseph; thanks to all fathers. We celebrate you today. We honor you. We remember you. ALL of us have fathers. Thanks to our Heavenly Father for the gift of life and the gift of Fatherhood.



Knights' Notes: June 20, 2021.

In late May the St. Ignatius Knights of Columbus, Fr. James McCafferty Council, 11013, received the PA State Council "Faith In Action Award". This award recognized the work our council members have done in conjunction with our parish Social Action Committee to establish a Community Emergency Fund which distributed funds to local families, individuals, and social service agencies that were adversely affected by the covid 19 pandemic. The Knights proudly thank all parishioners who contributed their financial support and their prayers. This fund raised a tremendous amount of funds for those in need while quietly demonstrating the Knights' goal of charity. Praise God.

Can we think back to past years? When you were younger, is it possible that your Mom and Dad or your grandparents displayed framed pictures of their parents and other loved ones on their mantles or on side tables? They were thought to be worthy of honor and remembrance. Try to remember another detail --- Did those homes also display on a wall a framed portrait of the Sacred Heart? You would recognize this unique picture of Jesus displaying His heart and the wounds in His hands from the crucifixion. What inspired this devotion? Is it still a common practice in Catholic homes? Should we, Catholics, consider a renewal of this tradition?

Devotions to the Sacred Heart of Jesus can be traced to the earliest days of Christianity. They were of great importance to St. Bernard, St. Ambrose, St. Gertrude, St. Bonaventure and others. The most significant source for devotion to the Sacred Heart in the form it is known today was Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647–1690), a French nun who claimed to have had apparitions of the Sacred Heart. She detailed the chief devotion to be reception of Holy Communion on the First Fridays of each month and repeated the promises Jesus made to her: "Those who followed these practices would not die without the sacraments and would not die in His displeasure." In the 19th century, another source for devotion to the Sacred Heart was Sister Mary of the Divine Heart (1863–1899), who urged Pope Leo XIII to consecrate the entire world to the Sacred Heart and to encourage the First Friday devotions. Pope Pius X reaffirmed this position in 1928 as did Pope Pius XII in 1956 and Pope Benedict XVI in 2006.

The Covid 19 pandemic brought about an increased awareness of death and the reality of its unpredictability. **Maybe it's time to refocus**. How fitting to get a picture of the Sacred Heart and make it a favorite in your home. Make it a clear lesson for your children. Devotions ebb and flow in sync with world events. and the new normal of a Christian life should gravitate to the endless love of Christ, symbolized in the picture of the Sacred Heart. What do we have to lose? Nothing can be more important than saving our immortal souls. It is never too soon to start. The feast of the Most Sacred Heart, like Easter, is a changeable date on the third Friday after Pentecost.. The world celebrated it just over a week ago on June 11th. God bless us and St. Margaret Mary Alacoque.
