



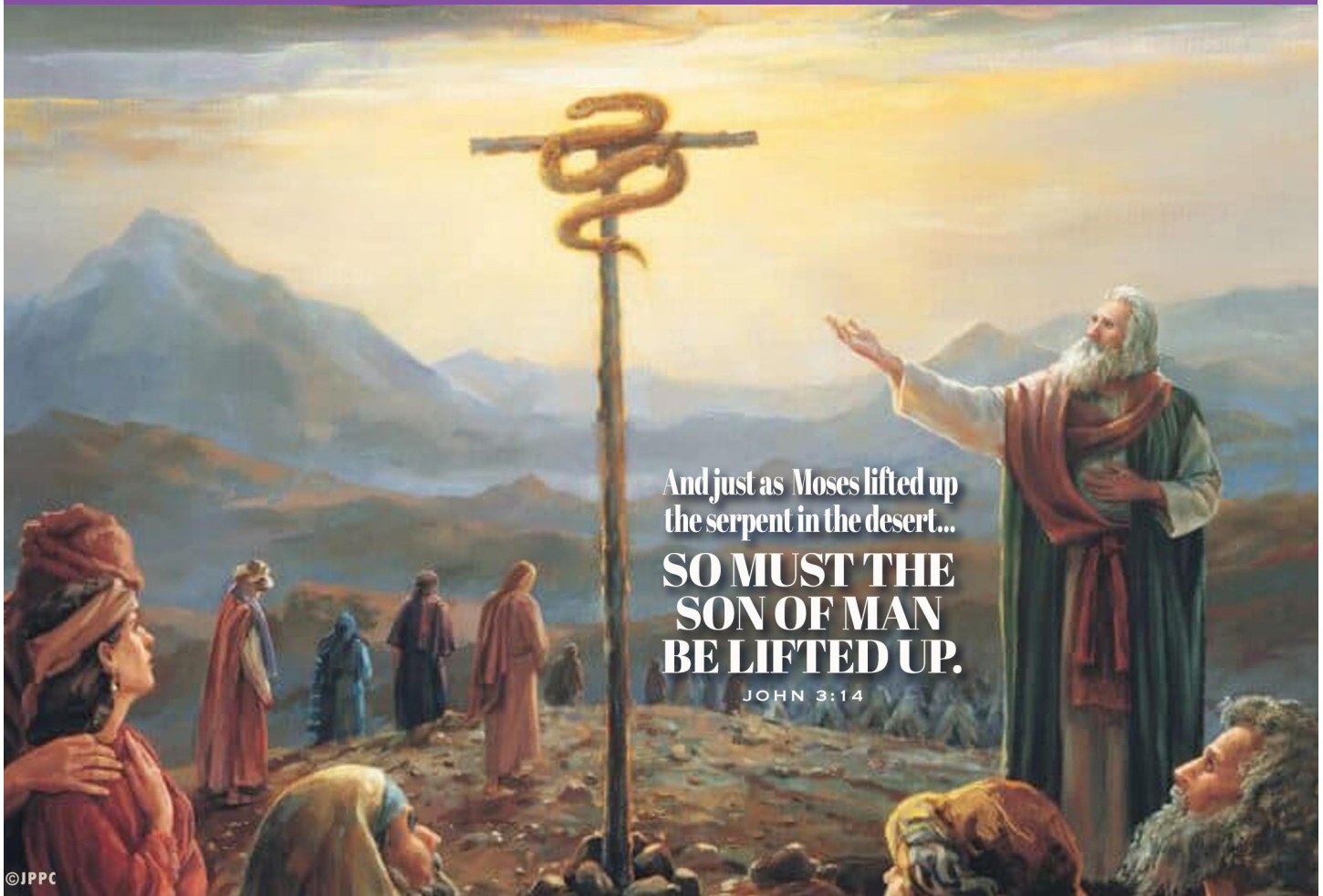

The Fourth Sunday of Lent

Reading I: 2 Chronicles 36: 14-16, 19-23

The story of a collapsed Judah follows divine judgment. The chief evil of ignoring the prophets brings about a 70 year long exile of the Israelites in Babylon. The unexpected decree of Cyrus king of Persia brings about a happy outcome.

Reading II: Ephesians 2: 4-10

God's great love for the world is most evident when He sends His only Son into the world as His greatest gift.

The Gospel: John 3: 14-21

The Father's love for the world is manifest in His Son Jesus. Jesus in turn tells His pupil Nicodemus that when "the Son of Man is lifted up" (on the cross) it will be a similar but much more powerful healing than that of the serpent lifted up in the desert.

The Fourth Sunday of Lent
March 14, 2021

First Reading

2 Chr 36:14-16, 19-23

In those days, all the princes of Judah, the priests, and the people added infidelity to infidelity, practicing all the abominations of the nations and polluting the LORD's temple which he had consecrated in Jerusalem.

Early and often did the LORD, the God of their fathers, send his messengers to them, for he had compassion on his people and his dwelling place. But they mocked the messengers of God, despised his warnings, and scoffed at his prophets, until the anger of the LORD against his people was so inflamed that there was no remedy.

Their enemies burnt the house of God, tore down the walls of Jerusalem, set all its palaces afire, and destroyed all its precious objects. Those who escaped the sword were carried captive to Babylon, where they became servants of the king of the Chaldeans and his sons until the kingdom of the Persians came to power.

All this was to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah: "Until the land has retrieved its lost sabbaths, during all the time it lies waste it shall have rest while seventy years are fulfilled."

In the first year of Cyrus, king of Persia, in order to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah, the LORD inspired King Cyrus of Persia to issue this proclamation throughout his kingdom, both by word of mouth and in writing: "Thus says Cyrus, king of Persia: All the kingdoms of the earth the LORD, the God of heaven, has given to me, and he has also charged me to build him a house in Jerusalem, which is in Judah.

Whoever, therefore, among you belongs to any part of his people, let him go up, and may his God be with him!"

Religious Education

From the Religious Education Office ... The PREP office is open from Sundays through Thursdays. Annmarie is in the office during the day from Monday through Thursday and in the Antioch Center (old rectory) on Sundays and weekday evenings.

PREP REGISTRATION: PREP (Parish Religious Education Program) is for children in Grades K to 8. PREP classes are being held remotely at the present time. Parents can find the lessons on the parish website. (Go to www.stignatius.church, and then click on PREP. The grade levels will come up, so click on the level you want. Finish up by completing the Interactive Session Review and send results to Mrs. Perini's email – lperini@stignatius.church). Each class's lesson will be available for 3 weeks only. Then the next lesson will replace it. Registered families can communicate with the teachers by email. If you want to register your child(ren), please stop in our office or call us (215-493-5204) to receive the registration form by email.

Special Needs: Parents, are you aware that we have a PREP class for students with special needs? If we could help to give your child a religious education in a small group environment, please call Annmarie at 215-493-5204.

8th Grade Students: We do have an 8th grade program for those students who have already received the Sacrament of Confirmation. Parents, please register your 8th grade students so they can continue to learn about God and his Church.

SACRAMENTS:

FIRST RECONCILIATION: If your child missed First Reconciliation on March 2, please contact Annmarie (215-493-5204) so we can set up another time.

FIRST COMMUNION: Please send in the \$25 Sacrament Fee as soon as possible. First Communion is scheduled for Saturday, April 17, 2021, at the 9:30 a.m. Mass and the 12:00 noon Mass. You will be receiving emails about rehearsal for First Communion as we get closer to that date.

CONFIRMATION: The candidate's paperwork, the sponsor's letter of eligibility, and the Confirmation fee is long past due. Confirmation is scheduled for Saturday, April 24, 2021, at 10:00 a.m. Mass and 1:30 p.m. Mass, with Bishop John J. McIntyre. You will be receiving emails about rehearsal for Confirmation as we get closer to that date. Don't forget to contribute to the Bishop's choice of charity (St. John's Hospice – a shelter for homeless men).

ADULT Faith FORMATION

This coming week we will be celebrating the feasts of two very popular Saints, St. Patrick and St. Joseph.

While more of us know and celebrate St. Patrick with Irish food/drink/music/parades and wearing of the 'green', not much is 'done' to celebrate St. Joseph. In fact, not much is known about St. Joseph. We do know he was the foster father of Jesus. We do know he speaks no words documented in the Bible. We don't know how old he was when he died. St. Joseph is the patron of the universal Church in Roman Catholicism. He was a descendant of the house of King David. His father's name was Jacob while his mother is not definitively named in the Bible. St. Joseph is the patron of a happy death. He did have appearances of angels and was obedient to those angelic messages. He was a carpenter. One thing that we all need to keep in mind is that St. Joseph is as close to Jesus as His mother Mary and that his intercession is very powerful. Pope Francis has designated as this year being dedicated to the honor of St. Joseph. We all need to pray to him to bring leadership to men, tenderness to women, care and protection to children and obedience, strength and compassion and care. One wonders why there are no parades, parties, colors or songs or food as popular to St. Joseph, not that there is anything wrong with those same celebratory aspects of St. Patrick's day. We are called to emulate the saints, study their lives and live accordingly. St. Joseph pray for us.

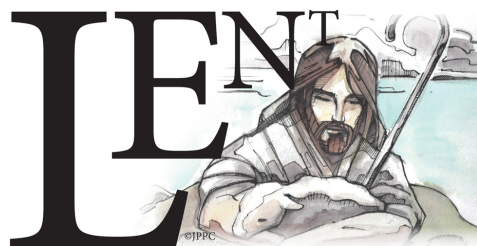
