

St. Rose of Lima Feast Day: August 23rd

The first canonized saint of the New World has one characteristic of all saints—the suffering of opposition—and another characteristic which is more for admiration than for imitation—excessive practice of mortification.

She was born to parents of Spanish descent in Lima, Peru, at a time when South America was in its first century of evangelization.

The saints have so great a love of God that what seems bizarre to us, and is indeed sometimes imprudent, is simply a logical carrying out of a conviction that anything that might endanger a loving relationship with God must be rooted out. So, because her beauty was so often admired, Rose used to rub her face with pepper to produce disfiguring blotches. Later, she wore a thick circlet of silver on her head, studded on the inside, like a crown of thorns

When her parents fell into financial trouble, she worked in the garden all day and sewed at night. Ten years of struggle against her parents began when they tried to make Rose marry. They refused to let her enter a convent, and out of obedience she continued her life of penance and solitude at home as a member of the Third Order of Saint Dominic. So deep was her desire to live the life of Christ that she spent most of her time at home in solitude.

During the last few years of her life, Rose set up a room in the house where she cared for homeless children, the elderly, and the sick. This was a beginning of social services in Peru. What might have been a merely eccentric life was transfigured from the inside. If we remember some unusual penances, we should also remember the greatest thing about Rose: a love of God so ardent that it withstood ridicule from without, violent temptation, and lengthy periods of sickness. When she died at 31, the city turned out for her funeral. Prominent men took turns carrying her coffin.

If any parent would like to volunteer as a PREP Classroom Aide or Door Monitor, we would be so grateful. Please call me.


There will be a special PREP class for students in grades 8 - 11 (Fee is \$50 per student). The day/night and time will be determined by those who participate in this class. The class is based on the program Decision Point. We use a video and group discussions on how to live your Faith as a teenager.

We will be having two retreats this year on Saturday mornings. The first will be an Advent retreat based on

Theology of the Body offered by theologian Bill Donaghy with two talks on the meaning of the body and the meaning of the Incarnation. This 'mini' retreat will begin with mass at 8:30 AM in the church followed by a light breakfast in the Church auditorium, followed by the two talks with a short break in between. RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY



"Although we may feel unsure how best to comfort those who mourn, we must stand with them in their time of suffering. Miscarriage touches the lives of many people, yet all too often this tragedy remains unaddressed. This lack of response not only often leads to unresolved grief, but also fails to clearly manifest our belief that each person, from conception onward, is precious and unique." Regardless of the length of pregnancy, be it days or weeks or months, any loss of child affects the mom, the dad and the family, and, ultimately our society as God does have a plan, and such loss needs to be grieved and mourned. The child is not just a 'clump of cells'. The child in the womb is a living human being with an immortal soul, created by God for a purpose, and is a living manifestation of the love between the parents, regardless of intent and destined to live for all eternity. Why God calls these children home early is a mystery that will only be answered for each of us at our final judgement and meeting with God face to face. Let us learn to mourn these losses and help these parents and families, not with a pat on the back or a statement like 'you can have another'! They need to grieve not any differently as the loss of parent, sibling, spouse or any other born person.
