


## Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time



Saint Irenaeus Feast Day: June 28th

The Church is fortunate that Irenaeus was involved in many of its controversies in the second century. He was a student, well trained no doubt, with great patience in investigating, tremendously protective of apostolic teaching, but prompted more by a desire to win over his opponents than to prove them in error.

As bishop of Lyons he was especially concerned with the Gnostics, who took their name from the Greek word for "knowledge." Claiming access to secret knowledge imparted by Jesus to only a few disciples, their teaching was attracting and confusing many Christians. After thoroughly investigating the various Gnostic sects and their "secret," Irenaeus showed to what logical conclusions their tenets led. These he contrasted with the teaching of the apostles and the text of Holy Scripture, giving us, in five books, a system of theology of great importance to subsequent times. Moreover, his work, widely used and translated into Latin and Armenian, gradually ended the influence of the Gnostics.

The circumstances and details about his death, like those of his birth and early life in Asia Minor, are not at all clear. However in 2022, Pope Francis named Saint Irenaeus a Doctor of the Church.

Those participating in online giving have found the program to be more convenient and allows them to maintain full control over their account.





We are now in the midst of summer and next week we will be in celebration of the Independence of the U.S. We can only hope and pray that our country continues to be independent within the confines of the needs of the common good. In ordinary political discourse, the 'common good' refers to facilities-

whether material, cultural or institutional- that the members of a community provide to all members in order to fulfill a relational obligation they have to care for certain interests they have in common. Three essential elements of the common good are respect for the person, the social well-being and development of the group and peace and security. The CCC defines the common good from Pope St. John XXIII as 'the sum total of social conditions which allow people, either as groups or individuals, to reach their fulfillment more fully and more easily'. The common good applies to each human community but its most complete realization occurs in the political community where the state's role is to 'defend and promote the common good of civil society, its citizens and intermediate bodies'. Everyone has a responsibility for the common good as an embodiment of charity and justice. "the more we strive to secure a common good corresponding to the real needs of our neighbors, the more effectively we love them. Every Christian is called to practice this charity, in a manner corresponding to his/her vocation and according to the degree of influence he wields in the polis". The common good is the reason that the political authority exists! So, as we progress through these troubled times, let us all pray for our leaders, both Church and government that they exercise those guidelines that embrace the common good.

# RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY



"We often assume parenthood happens easily after 'I do,' but for many married couples, it does not. For some, the joy of conception never happens. Others suffer repeated miscarriages. Still others experience primary or secondary infertility: in the latter instance after giving birth to one or more children, they are unable to have another... If you experience difficulty bringing a child into your family, know that you are not alone. God is with you, and his Church desires to walk with you."

God has a plan; He knows all and loves all of His children that HE has willed into existence; loss of children whether prior to birth or in childhood or adulthood is difficult to handle and difficult to understand. We need to remember that God can bring good out of all that appears/is evil. We need to be close to Jesus so we can be calmed in our grief with His grace and His love. He KNOWS our pain; Mary KNOWS our pain- she watched her Son die a horrible death! There is also much grief for those who wish to have children and cannot; again, God has a plan; He has His reasons which we cannot understand but we must have the faith the size of a 'mustard seed' to accept HIS will over ours and pray, and pray again for the graces to be calmed in the storm of infertility or loss.

#### CARMELITE FRIARS: PROVINCE OF SAINT ELIAS - MISSION OUTREACH

Although few in number, the **mission outreach** of the Carmelite Friars, Saint Elias Province, New York, is quite extensive.

For over sixty years, we have been providing manpower and financial assistance to Africa, specifically to Zimbabwe (formerly, Southern Rhodesia). More recently, we have been aiding Carmelite Missions in Mozambique, Kenya and the Republic of the Congo. And within the past thirty years, we have been helping the Carmelite Missions in India, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, the Philippines, Argentina, and Colombia. Our province has also been providing whatever help we can to the Carmelite Missions in Poland and the Czech Republic. It is not always possible for us to send Friars on a full-time basis, and so we try to help financially through funds raised mostly in the Mission Cooperative Appeal and with whatever part-time help or administrative help we can provide.

Responding to the needs of the church, and the call of the Holy Spirit through the local Bishops, the Carmelite Friars, St. Elias Province, have recently begun our own missions in Trinidad and Vietnam. Since we have already attracted many vocations in each place, we are also trying to establish formation programs in these countries. This has placed a considerable burden on our finances and on our ability to continue helping our other missionary endeavors.

#### MISSIONARY IN OUR MIDST

Next weekend, a Carmelite Friar will be with us at all Masses to tell us about Carmelite missionary work. The Carmelites respond to the call to love one another through prayer and action by establishing ministries where there is the greatest need. They create humanitarian programs to relieve the suffering of the poor, minister to those in hospitals and prisons, provide education, and conduct spiritual and religious formation in almost 40 countries on five continents. This year we are hoping to be of continued help to the victims of the war in Ukraine. Your generosity in the second collection next week to support the Carmelite Friars' missionary work will be greatly appreciated.
